# THE ANNUAL DINNER MEETING

Well, as I was saying, our speaker was U of T student Bill Noble who dealt extensively and in a most interesting manner with a dig in which he had taken part at Rocky Mountain House in Alberta, on the North Saskatchewan River. The site was originally a fur trading post and later was extended into a fort-type settlement. Mr. Noble was in charge of the dig and with a crew of five completed a full excavation. He also worked on the Brockett site in Southern Alberta and he gave us information about this as well, illustrating points from both sites with slides.
