This Month's Meeting

The regular monthly meetings of the Society will continue to be held on the third Wednesday of each month, commencing at 8.00pm. Beginning this month -- Wednesday, February 19 -- the meetings will be held in the lecture theatre of the McLaughlin Planetarium, Royal Ontario Museum. This, you may recall, was the location of the O.A.S.'s recent symposium on Ontario Iroquois Prehistory.

Although there is no public parking at the R.O.M., a public lot is available near the corner of Bloor St. and Avenue Rd. There is also a subway stop outside the Museum for those who wish to travel by public transportation. (Please note that trains on the University line do not operate after 9.45pm., but the subway at Yonge St. is just a short walk away.)

For those who might wish to visit the Museum before the meetings the building is open until 9.0pm. on Wednesdays. No entrance fee is charged after 5.0pm.

Speaker at the meeting on February 19 will be Dr. Peter Storck, President of the Ontario Archaeological Society. His subject will be "Early Man in Ontario".

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IN MEMORIAM

Fritz Knechtel is dead; kinsmen and friends must bear the loss. An important segment of the prehistory of Ontario, however, will stand as a lasting memorial to the foresight and perseverance of this truly exceptional man. Through cooperation with professional archaeologists, students, and non-professionals, by the all-encompassing political use of his tireless typewriter, and by a rare honest charm he was the catalyst that resulted in the prehistory of Bruce County being the best understood in the province. His dogged prodding of indifference and bureaucracy in the name of preservation and enlightenment stands as a model for us. There is no question in my mind that if each county and district of this province had possessed their Fritz Knechtel we would be far in advance of our present level of knowledge and, in addition, a number of vehicles for the preservation and development of the ever dwindling prehistoric resource would be developed. Fritz Knechtel made things happen and as a result his spirit continues to be viable.

Mr. Charles Garrad officially introduced the new O.A.S. President - Dr. Peter Storck - and retired (with relief, perhaps?) from his own strenuous and successful presidential year. In his opening address, Dr. Storck emphasized that he would do all in his power to forward the aims of the Society and to increase the productive relationship between the amateur and the professional archaeologist.

Speaker for the evening, Dr. J.N. Emerson, gave an interesting talk on the history of the first 24 years of the Society. Complete with facts and figures - lists of charter members, presidents, membership figures since 1951, an analysis of the Society's publications - he agreed that much of the original dream had been achieved, but that a lot still remains to be done.

One of his final points was on the necessity for the Society to have a "place of its own" but how that was to be managed, he did not know.
