PRESIDENT'S COMMUNIQUE

It's that time again. Time to plan to attend our 40th Anniversary Symposium, October 27 and 28, 1990. This Symposium and the events surrounding it should prove to be both informative and thought-provoking. Our Symposium theme is "trade" with many good papers ready to go. We plan to put forward two Constitutional Amendments and some other operational suggestions at the Annual Business Meeting on Saturday afternoon (more info. later). Continuing with the theme of change, Sunday will be devoted to an all-day discussion/workshop of FUTURE DIRECTIONS for the O.A.S. It's time to take stock of where we are and where we are going as an organization. A light lunch is available by preregistration to make a more efficient use of time (see elsewhere in this issue) for participants. Come along and have your say in framing the FUTURE DIRECTIONS of the OAS.

I would like to point out that the APA is sponsoring a Friday, October 26 workshop at the Heritage Centre (Toronto) on issues around self-regulation and professionalization (remember the recent questionnaire?) of the discipline. All are invited but you must preregister (see elsewhere in this issue). For those who cannot attend this Friday workshop, a brief recap will be given on Sunday morning at the OAS workshop.

I would now like to announce some special events. In recognition of our 40th Anniversary, the OAS will be awarding two silver Emerson Medals to two worthy candidates: William S. Donaldson and Charles Garrad. Both of these men have given generously of their time and energy to the growth

and development of the Society and both have made significant contributions to the knowledge base of our understanding of the prehistory of Ontario. We are hopeful that these, our highest awards, will be presented by Mrs Ann Emerson. Further, one 25 Year Member Pin will be awarded to Barry Mitchell, and we are equally pleased to announce that long time member Helen Devereux will be our Ridley Lecturer. It is the first time all of our awards will be given at the same Symposium!

Lastly, I would like to remind you about our 40th Anniversary commemorative book, "The Presidents Remember". I wanted to let you know that we feel very strongly that this book will be a really interesting retrospective of the growth and development of the Society and of archaeology in Ontario over the last 40 years. We feel so sure, that, despite the fact that the Ontario Heritage Foundation has rejected our grant application for support for its production, we are going ahead with the project. This will mean two things. First, we may have to reduce the printing costs by using cheaper materials. Secondly, I am appealing to you to support this truly interesting and worthy project by sending in a donation today. Our minimum suggestion donation is \$10.00. With this donation we will be pleased to include your name and "best wishes" to the Society in a special section of the book. Receipts for tax purposes will be available. If you represent a corporation and can afford a little more, we would be grateful. A special thank you to those of you who have already responded to our plea. We are grateful for your support. We would

like to commemorate this special year with this fond look backwards by the 22 presidents who have served your society, but it depends on you.

One final note. Director Bob Mayer has had to resign in mid-term from the Executive of the OAS. The remaining Executive members decided to ask those who served and retired most recently if any of them would fill in for the remainder of 1990. Several

individuals agreed and after a secret ballot held by the Executive, Lawrence Jackson was appointed interim Director. The Executive decided on this route as an election at this time, under the rules of the Constitution, would create a delay of unreasonable proportions in filling the position. I sincerely want to thank Bob for his service to the OAS.

Our Vision Reassessed

The O. A. S. in the next ten years

After forty years of operation and growth it is time for the OAS to reassess its *raison d'etre*, directions and aims.

We have a *Constitution*, which includes 'Aims', and *Letters Patent* which outline the direction of the Society as perceived in 1952 and 1956 respectively. These are:

[from the *Constitution*, ARTICLE II, AIMS OF THE SOCIETY]

1. To bring together individuals interested in the practice, promotion and advancement of archaeology, particularly in the Province of Ontario;
2. To encourage and assist every effort, both individual and collective, which may tend to foster, elevate and advance archaeology in the fields of learning and culture, and to develop new sources of progress whenever and wherever possible;
3. To seek proper means to discourage illegal investigation and excavation;
4. To facilitate exchange of ideas, cooperation and social intercourse among those interested in archaeology and to foster friendship among members of other similar societies and this one, and so promote a better understanding of its objectives;
5. To publish archaeological literature and site reports in the interests of archaeology;
6. To stimulate the interest of the general public in archaeology.

[from the *Letters Patent*]

"to preserve, promote, investigate, record and publish an archaeological

record of the Province of Ontario".

The Executive feels that it is important now for the membership to voice its concerns around these 'aims' and to help assess them in light of today. For example, where should the OAS be going over the next ten years? Should we hold to the *status quo*? More efforts in lobbying? Less publication? Increased efforts towards volunteer opportunities?

This is your opportunity to direct the future VISION of your Society. Now is the time to help determine a mandate appropriate for the next ten years. Your opportunity for input will be on SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1990 at the Symposium. The discussions will be moderated by the President, Christine Caroppo. A tentative Agenda for the day is as follows:

IS THERE A PROVINCIAL ELECTION COMING UP?

Here are some questions for those campaigning politicians. You may like to pin them up behind your front door!

"As a voter concerned with archaeology and heritage, I am interested in your view on heritage. For instance....

1) You may be aware that proposed revisions to the Ontario Heritage Act have been circulated for public review. One change involves a proposal to assert Crown ownership of archaeological artifacts in right of the people of Ontario. *Can we count on your support for this proposal?*

2) The Wintario lottery was established in part to support the work of provincial heritage organizations but only a token amount of Wintario funds is reaching these organizations. *Would you undertake to ensure that provincial heritage organizations (the OAS, the OHS, etc.) have improved access to the funds established for them? Alternatively, would you support the establishment of a separate lottery operated collectively by and for the provincial heritage*

organizations without government intervention?

3) During a recent archaeological master plan study in Scarborough, an extremely important Seneca village site was identified. We feel that the privately owned segment of this former village should be acquired, and the entire site be included in the proposed Rouge Valley park. *Can we count on your support for the acquisition of these lands?*

4) In Ontario the conflicting right of a property owner to control his/her own property and the collective right of the citizens to have access to their heritage is unresolved. For example very few major archaeological-historical-heritage sites are in public hands and concerned citizens are largely helpless to prevent developers from demolishing and destroying historic buildings and sites. Present legislation has notoriously failed to intervene on the public behalf. There is no funded provision for compulsory negotiation and public acquisition of heritage property. *Will you support the introduction of legislation addressed to the resolution of this conflict?*

Upcoming Grant Deadlines

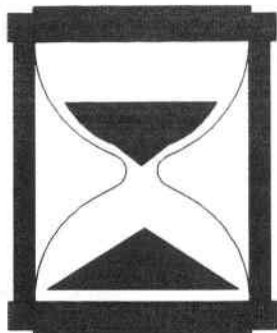

Only RESEARCH and AID-TO-PUBLICATION applications will be considered for this deadline. Funds for the other categories are depleted.

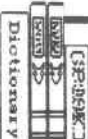
The new guidelines will be available by August. Call Gloria Taylor after the 15th for guideline and application forms.

PRELIMINARY NOTICE OF PROPOSED MOTION TO AMEND CONSTITUTION

Two motions were passed by the Executive Committee at the Committee meeting of July 4, 1990:

(90-20) In the event of the resignation of an executive officer, the remaining executive members can appoint at their discretion any Society member in good standing to serve the remaining portion of the term.

(90-21) Be it moved that the Constitution be changed to allow for the election of seven OAS Directors for the 1991 year. At the first Executive Committee meeting in January 1991, the elected slate of Directors will decide the Executive positions of President, Secretary, Treasurer and Directors among themselves.

In accordance with Article XI of the Society's Constitution a formal notification of change will be distributed to the membership accompanying a request for ratification in due course.

* * * * *

ABOUT THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

It is recognized that a number of amendments to the Society's Constitution are necessary and it is intended to re-examine the entire document at some future date. At this time it is intended only to ease the

ever-increasing work-load on the Society's Executive Officers by increasing and maintaining their number. The amendments propose to increase the number of elected directors from five to seven and to provide for the speedy replacement of any who resign during term.

When the Society was founded forty years ago with a membership of 32, three Executive Officers were thought sufficient. When the Society was incorporated in 1956, five Directors were named. The membership was then 42. Today the Society has an international membership in excess of 800, with seven Chapters, but it still has only five Directors. It is true that since 1979 the Society has had a paid employee to carry as much as possible of the routine workload of program delivery and services to members, but the multitudinous demands of governments for Executive time as representing archaeology in this province and for time-consuming compliance with grant and other requirements has outstripped the ability of one employee to bring further relief. It is hoped that expanding the number of Executive Officers (Directors in the terminology of the Corporations Act) from five to seven will attract more members into serving in an Executive capacity and allow their more even and happy development.

Another aspect of concern arising from past experience is the situation of two people running for one specific position on the Executive Committee while other positions were without candidates. With no procedure to allow the defeated candidate to then fill a vacant position the defeated candidate was deprived of the opportunity to serve, and the Executive was deprived of a potentially valuable volunteer officer. There seems no ideal remedy if members prefer to vote for candidates linked to a specific position such as President, Secretary,

Treasurer. The proposal that the membership elect seven Directors, among which three will assume the specific duties of President, Secretary and Treasurer, is therefore somewhat experimental.

Another recent challenge is how to replace a director who resigns during term with a replacement who has a mandate from the membership to so serve when there is not sufficient time before the term expires to hold the by-election which the Society's Constitution provides (XVII(8)) for such a contingency. In recent instances the Executive was able to ask previously-elected Directors, as people who had demonstrably enjoyed the confidence of the membership by election to the Executive, to fill short-term vacancies by appointment. The possibility could occur when no previously-elected director was available to fill a remaining term which was too long to leave vacant but too short to fill by by-election. The need to ensure a director has a mandate from the membership and the need to find a quick replacement for a resigned director seem to defy conciliation. The proposal that the membership extend the mandate of the elected directors to include their appointment of other directors on behalf of the membership under prescribed and limited circumstances is therefore also somewhat experimental.

The Executive Committee has pondered at length over these problems and offers the proposed amendments to the views of the members at this time for mature consideration before possible ratification.

HUMAN BURIALS REFERRAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Chiefs of Ontario and The Ontario Archaeological Society cooperatively announce a new program to Ontario archaeologists who need to locate the nearest First Nation when human remains are discovered. A list of the 129 Ontario First Nations, with the names of current Chiefs, addresses, telephone and fax numbers, updated to June 1990, has been provided by the Chiefs of Ontario to the Society with the intention of "assuring that the First Nations in Ontario are fully involved when human burials are discovered". The Ontario Archaeological Society will consider the most effective means of disseminating and maintaining this information to all archaeologists in the province. Until further notice, this information is

accessed by telephone or FAX to the OAS office during business hours. Photocopies of the document can be requested at \$5 to cover copying and mailing charges. It is recognised that the details are subject to change, particularly the names of Chiefs as elections occur. The extent to which this new service is used could determine if it will be offered as a computer-accessible data base.

Because of its length, this Directory will not be incorporated into the Society's "Archaeological Directory of Ontario" (Special Publication no. 8) as had been considered.
